This term our Trust wide event was World Book Day. Students across the Trust were invited to become award winning published authors! Students at Maritime were set the challenge of writing a short story that encompassed our school ethos and values – 'Making Excellence a Habit' and 'Strength – Pride – Unity'.

We were overwhelmed with the response from our students, receiving nearly 100 student entries. The stories showcased how they have made incredible progress with their English writing skills since they have joined Maritime. A winner from each Fleet was announced as part of our Community Lunch. Each Student was awarded with a book to keep as a prize. A Huge congratulations to the following Students:
















British Science Week:


Maritime Students have taken part in a range of activities for British Science Week.

This year's theme was connections, nearly all innovations in Science, Technology, Engineering, Maths are built on connections of two or more people working together.

Starting with an assembly and their British Science week menu, here are a couple of the connection challenges that they were involved in.

British Science Week:

Maritime students created a start-up business, connected carbon emissions to food and climate change challenges, built recycled rockets, took part in live talks for Ks3 and Ks4 with 27 other schools, on Test Tubes to treatment in the NHS. The students posed meaningful questions to the PHD researchers and Doctors, and finally finished with the No Plastics in School challenge, in which we are aiming to gain accreditation.





British Science Week:

In this connections challenge students designed a start-up business to make decomposable plant seedling plugs to plant directly into the ground, preventing plastic pots from being used and to prevent root damage. They sourced their materials, costs and designed their pot to suit the general market. This pot was aimed at the Horticultural market.







In this connections challenge, students designed sustainable rocket fuel, rocket experiments demonstrating conservation of momentum, the test on rockets from two vendors that combine baking soda and vinegar for propulsion. The experiment compared two analytical approximations for the maximum rocket height.

Students took part in plastics clean up around the school grounds. Picking up plastic rubbish that had littered around the perimeter of the schools' fences.

The students continue to collect their plastics to support the school being plastic free. This of course is in line with the plastic free water bottles that are provided to every child at the Maritime Academy.



Wear a Hat Day:

One of our Values is 'Unity' so on Friday 31st March we all came together to raise important funds to donate to Brain Tumour Research. We know that research conducted by scientists in these important areas helps to develop treatments and support people who are living with a brain tumour.



At Maritime we value the hard work and dedication of scientists to continue to demonstrate strength of character to continue to develop this much needed area of research.

Our Wear a Hat Day was a huge success. We are incredibly grateful to our families for supporting the community in being united to support research in this important area of science.

Should men and women's sports teams be paid the same?








CURRICULUM

Congratulations to all students for their continued efforts as the school year progresses!






SOCIAL MEDIA

SEND Emotional Literacy Support:

We are delighted to share with our families that Mrs Mallion will be beginning her Voyage with us as she joins Maritime after Easter as our Emotional Literacy Support Assistant.

She will be spending the term getting to know our community and learning all about our students. She will be working closely with Mrs Hall, our SENDCo as part of our network of support that we provide for our students.

We have a number of resources available on our website to support our students and families, some of which are highlighted below.

Kooth

Kooth is an online resource that provides free, safe and anonymous support for young people. It offers support such as talking to counsellors, access to articles written by young people, access to a 'Kooth community' (including forums) and a place to write daily journals. The service is available for 10-25yr olds.



Moodspark

A place where young people aged 10-16 can learn how to look after their emotional and mental health and find ways to help them bounce back when life gets tough.





STUDENT REMINDERS

Stationery:

Part of our expectations is that Students turn up to the Academy everyday ready to learn. This includes having the right equipment for learning.

Please ensure that your child has the following equipment when they return next term to ensure they can flourish with their learning.

Students are also reminded that we are a sustainable school and therefore only a Maritime water bottle is permitted to be used for drinking during the school day.



STUDENT REMINDERS

Uniform:

Our Students arrive to school each day looking smart and demonstrating Strength - Pride - Unity and are valued members of our Academy Community.

It is therefore expected that all Students meet the standard expected and follow the uniform policy to avoid a sanction.

Any hair accessories, socks, tights, gloves and additional items that are permitted under the uniform policy must be navy and understated.



Make-up, false nails, hair dye, smart watches and any other item that is not deemed acceptable under our uniform policy are likely to be confiscated and a sanction applied.

Ensure that you remind yourself of the standards expected before you return to the Academy in January.

Mobile Phones:

Our rules are simple - phones should not be heard or seen on the Academy site at all. If they are seen they will be confiscated for a week for the 1st offence and a term for the 2nd offence. Students attend school to learn.

Office Reminders

Lateness:

Registers open at 8.30am and close at 8.40am. Any student arriving between these times will be marked using an 'L' code (late whilst register is open). Any student arriving after 8.40am will be marked using a 'U' code (late after registers closes). A 'U' code is an unauthorised late and will mark the student as unauthorised for the morning session. It will affect the student's overall attendance figure.

Absence:

If a student is going to be absent from school, please contact the school before 9.00am stating the reason for absence. Parents/Carers are expected to telephone the school on each day of their child's absence to provide an update. If a student is absent from school for more than 3 days, medical evidence is required to authorise the absence. On returning to school, a written letter must be provided stating the reason for the absence along with any medical evidence.

Appointments:

Please ensure that an appointment card/letter has been shared with the school prior to the appointment. Where an emergency appointment has been arranged please obtain an appointment card upon your visit.
